A Message from the City Manager

Cupertino prides itself on being a financially stable organization and has been fortunate that revenues have outpaced expenditures for the last several years. With healthy reserves and projected surpluses in the next five years, the City is well positioned to continue enhancing services and addressing the primary needs of the community.

The FY 2018 Adopted Budget reflects a total City budget of \$148.9 million, an increase of \$15.6 million or 12% when compared to the FY 2017 Adopted Budget. The City's General Fund is at \$75.1 million, a decrease of \$2.2 million or 3% from the FY 2017 Adopted Budget. This year the City has made strategic investments in the areas of transportation, emergency preparedness, senior recreation services, and Council staff support.

As a result of the diligent work and collaboration of City Council and staff, the FY 2018 Adopted Budget is a balanced and fiscally responsible spending plan. 


Fiscal Year 2017-18 Adopted Budget FLOW OF FUNDS

The three most important things to learn from this chart

- The chart below demonstrates how expenditures (left to right) and revenues (right to left) flow into each type of City fund.
- Where the expenditures meet the revenues at the center of the chart (fund type line), a gap to the left is indicative of the use of one-time funding, such as prior year savings.
- A gap to the right is indicative of an increase to the City's fund balance/savings for that fund type.




Revenues Where does the City get its money?






Cupertino Residents and the Budget: Sales Taxes







How a (Hypothetical) Resident Contributes to Cupertino's Budget

ANNUAL SALES TAX CONTRIBUTION

If Cupertino's population totals 64,698 and if sales tax revenues collected in Cupertino total \$207M, of which the City of Cupertino would get \$22.7M (11%) then the sales tax contribution to the City per resident is **\$352**




New Personnel to Provide Services
