SUBJECT: Items of Interest

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### **SB 1383 Legislative Update**

SB 1383 was signed into law in September 2016 with the intent to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants (SLCP), such as methane, and CO<sub>2</sub>. The legislation set targets of 50% reduction of statewide disposal of organic waste from the 2014 level by 2020 and a 75% reduction by 2025. The initial draft language with its prescriptive and process-oriented approach was disconcerting to many jurisdictions. The Santa Clara County Recycling Waste Reduction Committee (RWRC) and some jurisdictions within the County submitted comments to CalRecycle. While some points were resolved in the January 18, 2019 revision of SB 1383, cities like Cupertino, Mountain View, and San José, which have established organics and food scrap recycling programs, remained concerned. The latest regulatory text could cost cities unnecessary dollars, require additional staff, and not result in better programs or more diversion of organics from landfill than what they are accomplishing with their existing programs.

With the January 2019 release of the proposed regulatory text, a countywide ad hoc legislative subcommittee was formed to review and develop additional comments. The City's Environmental Programs staff participated in these meetings to ensure that the progressive organics diversion approach Cupertino implemented beginning in 2010 was recognized and legislative language creating a two-track approach be considered. The legislation is a broad brush approach that impacts all jurisdictions within the State and does not recognize effective programs already implemented by progressive jurisdictions such as Cupertino. City's comments to CalRecycle are attached below.

### **City Hosts Google Workshop for Small Businesses**

On February 27 the City, in conjunction with the Cupertino Chamber of Commerce, Grow With Google, and Pacific Workplaces, hosted the first of a series of Google-focused free small business workshops. This first workshop, "Get Found on Google Search and Maps" was well attended

with over 60 people in attendance. Economic Development Manager Angela Tsui has requested a copy of the Google presenter's PowerPoint to post on the City's website for easy accessibility. Future small business workshops will include: Growing Your Social Media Presence, Reach Customers Online with Google, and Using Data to Drive Growth.



## **City Council and Commission Meeting Minutes Transcription**

Staff was asked to look into different ways of providing transcription of City Council and Commission meeting minutes.

### **Outside vendor transcription service**

- Done by a human after the meeting from the audio/video
- Cost \$33 to \$60 per hour
- Typically takes 4-5 times the length of the meeting to transcribe
- Example: 5-hour meeting would take 20-25 hours to transcribe for an estimated average of \$742 per meeting or \$17,800 per year
- Text is searchable
- City of Palo Alto uses an outside transcription service to provide “sense (summary)” minutes for reference only and action minutes and video recording are considered the official record
- City of Palo Alto tried verbatim minutes but found length of minutes to be unwieldy for Council, staff, and public

### **Granicus (current vendor) captioning and transcription service for televised meetings**

- Live transcriber during the meeting provides real-time captioning for viewers of the live Granicus feed
- Captions are immediately available for all of the on demand archives as well
- Transcriptions are searchable
- Optional caption encoder for City Channel viewers can be purchased for about \$3,000
- City provides transcriber with list of proper names and locations unique to Cupertino (which helps with the accuracy of the transcription)
- Transcription document available within 48 hours after meeting
- Not intended as verbatim minutes (City’s responsibility to make any necessary corrections)
- After-the-fact captioning/transcription service also available at about \$200/hour
- 98% accuracy rate
- Dynamic Pricing (the more contact hours bought, the lower the rate)
- Average Price: \$140/Hour (i.e. for 50 hours/year contract)
- Cities of Sunnyvale and San Jose use Granicus captioning services for reference only and action minutes and video recording are considered the official record

### **3PlayMedia caption and transcription service (youtube live)**

- YouTube Live has auto-captioning feature for videos up to about four hours in duration
- Only about 88-90% accurate
- The auto-captioning (speech-to-text) has difficulty with proper names and syntax
- Auto-captioning does not work for videos with durations of 4 hours and greater
- Average Pricing: \$2.50/minute
- Translation Services (other languages): \$10-\$26/minute depending on the language



### **3PlayMedia Zoom Room conferencing captions and transcriptions for commission meetings**

- Transcriptions are available in the following formats...
  - \* Keyword Cloud
  - \* Word Doc
  - \* P3 Transcript
  - \* JS Transcript
  - \* PDF
  - \* Plain Text
  - \* Stamped Doc
  - \* HTML
  - \* JSON Transcript
- Digital transcripts are searchable
- Can also add subtitles to Zoom Room video recordings
- Standard Caption encoding and transcription rate: \$2.50/minute (\$150/hr.)
- Standard transcription turnaround is 4 business days
- Zoom Room Language translation services vary between \$9/minute and \$25/minute depending on the language

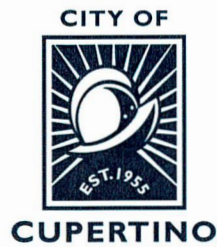

Re: Comments for Revision of SB 1383 Proposed Regulations

The City of Cupertino thanks CalRecycle for the opportunity to provide comments for the potential revision of the proposed SB 1383 regulations.

The City fully supports the intent and goals of SB 1383. Like several other jurisdictions, Cupertino has long demonstrated a serious commitment to reducing landfill disposal. In 2010 the City's 75% diversion goal was incorporated into its franchised hauler agreement with an incentive for a contract extension based on the hauler achieving the goal. To ensure success a Citywide food scraps and organics collection and composting program was offered at no additional charge to all commercial, residential, and multifamily customers. In 2014, when voluntary participation was lower than expected, the City, with the help of its hauler, increased its outreach and adopted a mandatory organics ordinance. The City's organics ordinance accelerated the State's implementation timeline and surpassed the requirements of SB 1826.

The City's evolving organics program has been carefully researched, designed, piloted, implemented and enhanced for almost a decade. If it can be demonstrated that established organics programs like the City of Cupertino's, meet the overall organics diversion goal of SB 1383, they should be granted the flexibility to build on the programs in a manner that works best for their community. This is especially true in regards to inspection and enforcement requirements, which as proposed would require additional staff without increasing the effectiveness of the existing program. Progress in jurisdictions like the City of Cupertino may only be slowed if we are unnecessarily burdened with the one-size-fits-all requirements of the proposed SB 1383 regulations.

Jurisdictions are not all alike. Those that have already made commitments to achieve Zero Waste (90 percent diversion) and have been early adopters of improvements to their programs and facilities should be allowed flexibility to determine how best to ensure compliance with organics waste reduction requirements within their own communities.

## Comments

### Revision to Articles 3 and 13 –

The City of Cupertino requests that CalRecycle add the following new Section to Article 3 allowing a jurisdiction to choose an “Alternative” collection and compliance system; and add a new Section to Article 13 to simplify the reporting requirements.

### Article 3. Organic Waste Collection Services

#### Add New Section 18984.13. Alternative Collection Systems

- (a) A jurisdiction may implement an alternative collection system that consists of any one of or any combination of those allowed under Sections 18984.1, 18984.2 and 18984.3. The alternative system may, but is not required to, incorporate the provisions required by Sections 18984.5 and 18984.6, and will furthermore not be subject to the requirements of Articles 14, 15 and 16.
- (1) A jurisdiction that chooses to implement an alternative collection system must:
- i. Have an adopted Zero Waste Plan or Zero Waste Policy by December 31, 2019;
  - ii. Have an overall pounds per capita per day disposal rate equivalent to at least a 68 percent overall diversion rate for calendar year 2019;
  - iii. Achieve a reduction in the overall pounds per capita per day disposal rate equivalent to a minimum 80 percent diversion rate for calendar year 2025, as demonstrated by the annual AB 939 report submitted on August 1, 2026.
- (2) A jurisdiction that has not achieved a minimum 80 percent diversion rate for the calendar year 2025 will no longer be approved to implement the alternative system and must be in full compliance with all the provisions of Sections 18984.5, 18984.6 and Articles 14, 15 and 16 no later than January 1, 2027.

### Article 13

#### Revise Section 18994.2 ~~Jurisdiction~~ Annual Reporting for Jurisdictions Implementing Three-Container, Two-Container or Unsegregated Collection Systems

- (a) Through (k) no changes

#### Add New Section 18994.3 Annual Reporting for Jurisdictions Implementing an Alternative System

- (a) On August 1, 2022 a jurisdiction choosing to implement an alternative collection system as provided by Section 18984.13 shall provide a written description of all the elements that are included in the system, including:
- (1) The type of organic waste collection service(s) provided by the jurisdiction to its generators;
  - (2) The total number of generators that receive each type of organic waste collection service provided by the jurisdiction;

- (3) Any waste processing being conducted, including the facility being used, how such waste processing is used in conjunction with collection systems, and the number of generators that have waste processed at the facility;
  - (4) A description of the outreach and education activities provided by the jurisdiction to organics generators;
  - (5) Copies of any ordinances adopted by the jurisdiction related to the alternative system;
  - (6) The type of inspection and enforcement system in use;
  - (7) Any further system elements the jurisdiction plans to implement prior to January 1, 2025.
- (b) Commencing on August 1, 2022 and annually thereafter, a jurisdiction shall report the information required by Section 18994.2(g) through (i). The report submitted in 2022 shall cover the period of January 1, 2022-June 30, 2022. Each subsequent report shall cover the entire previous calendar year.

A jurisdiction selecting an alternative collection system would demonstrate high diversion of organics in lieu of being subject to the inspection, enforcement and reporting requirements of Articles 14, 15 and 16. High diversion of organics may be demonstrated by the achievement of a significantly reduced per capita disposal, as measured by an equivalent overall jurisdiction diversion rate of 80 percent or higher. Per capita disposal is already measured as part of the annual AB 939 review process. If a jurisdiction fails to achieve a reduction in per capita disposal equivalent to an 80 percent diversion rate in 2025, then that jurisdiction would be required to implement one of the other three collection system options and become subject to all the requirements of Articles, 13, 14, 15, and 16.

A similar “two track” compliance system was used by the State Water Resources Control Board in the adoption of its Trash Amendments for the Ocean Plan and the Water Quality Control Plan for Inland Surface Waters. The two track compliance approach offered by the State’s Trash Amendments gave jurisdictions the choice of installing trash full capture devices on inlets throughout the jurisdiction or implementing a trash load reduction program that achieves the equivalent of the State’s requirement.

**Article 10, Section 18991.3 Commercial Edible Food Generators** - The Proposed Regulation should clarify that food sales at large events and large venues that are NOT a part of the venue’s direct concession services should be exempt from the food donation requirements. Examples include food trucks located in/at large venues and events, non-regulated food vendors, and persons serving food outside of the event or venue such as tailgating.

**Recovered Organic Waste Product Procurement – Article 12, Section 18993.1** establishes procurement targets for the purchase of organic waste products. We understand the need to create markets for recovered waste products. However the current proposal, which

relies heavily on the purchase of renewable transportation fuel, is likely to result in a large investment of vehicles and equipment that can utilize these fuels. As we do everything reasonable to electrify our fleets in order to meet the State's AB 32 goals, any investments required in vehicles and equipment that run on fuels derived from organics are essentially a step backward in our mutual efforts to combat climate change.

**Article 14, Section 18995.2(c)** – The proposed regulations require a jurisdiction to provide access to its implementation records within one business day. The California Public Records Act indicates an agency must provide the records within a reasonable period of time and allows ten-day period for response. We request the text change from one business day to ten days.
