## **Deputy City Clerk Certification**

Kirsten has fulfilled all of the requirements to obtain her Master Municipal Clerk (MMC) designation.

In order to obtain a Master Municipal Clerk designation, one must have already obtained a Certified Municipal Clerk status and an additional 60 Advanced Education and 40 Professional Contribution points.

The program is sponsored by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks (IIMC) and is an important declaration of proficiency and mastery of skills critical to the Office of the City Clerk. The IIMC was founded in 1947 and is the leading professional nonprofit association serving the needs of Municipal Clerks from cities and towns throughout the world.

## **Public Works Staff Presents the City's Integrated Pest Management Program (IPM) At Parks & Recreation Commission**

At the May 2, 2019 Parks and Recreation Commission meeting, Public Works Staff was invited to make a presentation regarding the City's Integrated Pest Management (IPM) program, specifically on the use of pesticides on school sites. After a brief presentation, public works environmental and maintenance staff provided answers to questions from the Commission and the public.

## **Blackberry Farm Golf Course Information**

The City Council recently expressed interest in considering the future of the Blackberry Farm Golf Course. Potential changes to the Blackberry Farm Golf Course and associated financial effects were evaluated as part of the Stevens Creek Corridor Master Plan process. On April 5, 2016, a study session report and presentation to the City Council included a draft preferred alternative for the overall creek corridor that included an alternative for the golf course. Attachment D of the staff report provided detailed financial projections for a golf course alternative that would renovate the course to a par 3, executive-style course that could accommodate shorter "loops" of 3, 4, 5 or 7 holes, and offer more training and practice opportunities. It was preceded by a report for the Stevens Creek Corridor presented to the City Council at a December 16, 2014 study session. A golf course evaluation was provided at Attachment K to the staff report. The evaluation considered 3 scenarios, including an "as-is" scenario, an option that retained most of the current yardage, and a shorter par-3 scenario that became the basis for the

subsequent report noted above. Pro forma financial information was provided for these 3 scenarios. The report is available at the following link:

## **City Hall Chiller Failures**

One of two chillers at City Hall failed on Tuesday, April 9 and air conditioning was put back in service on Friday, April 26. Repairs included replacing one of two compressors and decommissioning three refrigerant tubes that were near or at failure. The total cost of the repairs was approximately \$38,000.

Of the remaining refrigerant tubes within the one chiller, another six tubes are approaching failure. (Graphic summary of the condition of the tubes is attached.) If not caught quickly, a tube failure may take another compressor out of service. This would result in a similar costs and downtime for City Hall air conditioning.

The two chillers in service are not original to the building and are approximately 32 years old. The serviceable life for chillers of this type is about 20-25 years and replacement parts are becoming a challenge. Replacement of the cooling system at City Hall is estimated to cost \$300,000 and are not being scheduled for replacement. Staff will continue to react to any issues and will monitor operations. Future equipment failures have the potential to cause uncomfortable conditions for employees and the public.

## **Compliment Regarding Public Works Senior Civil Engineer - Winnie Pagan**

Winnie Pagan has worked for the Public Works Development Services Department since May 2013, and manages much of the day to day Development Services review coordination. She reviews and manages most of the City's residential projects and has expanded her role over the years to include oversight of many of the City's larger development projects, such as the De Anza Hotel and Cupertino Village projects. Her ability to take a consistent approach to the review process has allowed her to provide developers and property owners a straight forward path to permit approvals. The attached letter, from one the City's applicants, shows his appreciation for her "clear and appropriate" approach to the development review process.

## **Sales Tax Update (Oct-Dec 2018)**

Sales Tax summary report on sales tax collections in Cupertino by major group (where allowable). This includes a brief description of changes from the same time period a year ago, compared to County, and State sales tax collections. Sales tax data is required to be kept confidential by Revenue and Taxation Code Section 7056. Thus, it is unlawful for any person who

obtains access to sales and use tax records, to make known in any manner the information disclosed on any [tax] return, including any abstract thereof. Accordingly, a local agency may not disclose amounts of tax paid, whether tax amounts are up or down from a prior period, or any other information that would reveal the business affairs or operations of a business.

Sales tax payments for groups of businesses may be revealed to the general public if the so-called "gang of four" and "80%" rule are followed. These rules allow combined data for four or more businesses to be released as long as no single member of the group is the source of a disproportionate percentage, defined herein as 80%, of the group total. The "group" may be defined as businesses in the same shopping center, a specific business type such as new auto sellers, or businesses sharing the same major business group.

## Weed Abatement Program Update

At the February 5, 2019 meeting, Council removed three parcels from the Cupertino Weed Abatement Program and directed staff to initiate compliance inspections of those properties in late spring and in time for the April 30 deadline. On May 1, County staff completed inspections on the parcels and reported that one out of three are in compliance. A list of the parcels and inspection photos are included below. The County cannot perform abatement on the two noncompliant parcels since they are no longer in the program and is requesting direction from Council on how to proceed. They've provided the following options:

1. Take no action and wait another year.
2. Order the parcels to be added to the Weed Abatement Program but do not seek abatement.
3. Hold a special hearing, allowing for the parcels to be added to Weed Abatement Program and providing for re-inspection, abatement, and recovery of County costs of abatement.

Council also directed staff to publish media notifications to inform all Cupertino parcels owners of weed abatement requirements and to remind them of the compliance deadline. ### What is the Weed Abatement Program and Why Am I Receiving This Notice in the Mail?

The Santa Clara County Department of Agriculture and Environmental Management and the City of Cupertino are working together to prevent fire hazards posed by vegetative growth and the accumulation of combustible materials.

Property owners are required to keep their property free of fire hazards—such as weeds—throughout the year. However, the Minimum Fire Safety Standards (MFSS) are required to be met each year by the April 30 deadline and then maintained through the fire season. Vegetation must not exceed six inches in height any time after the compliance deadline.

The Weed Abatement Program is entirely funded from fees charged to residents if:

1. The County contractor must perform weed abatement work on the property, or
2. If the property is not in compliance with MFSS when it is first inspected by the County in the spring. Properties that fail the initial inspection will be charged an inspection fee, even if the resident completes the weed abatement. Properties that meet and maintain the MFSS will not be charged.

County staff annually inspect parcels at the beginning of the fire season, which is typically in March or April. If the property is not in compliance, the property owner will pay a fee equal to the contractor's charges plus a County administrative fee. All fees will be included in your property tax bill.

## **City Council and Commission Meeting Minutes Transcription**

Staff was asked to look into different ways of providing transcription of City Council and Commission meeting minutes. The information below was previously provide in Items of Interest on February 28, 2019. Staff will bring this to Council with a recommendation on how to proceed this summer.

### **Outside vendor transcription service**

- Done by a human after the meeting from the audio/video
- Cost \$33 to \$60 per hour
- Typically takes 4-5 times the length of the meeting to transcribe
- Example: 5-hour meeting would take 20-25 hours to transcribe for an estimated average of \$742 per meeting or \$17,800 per year
- Text is searchable
- City of Palo Alto uses an outside transcription service to provide “sense (summary)” minutes for reference only and action minutes and video recording are considered the official record
- City of Palo Alto tried verbatim minutes but found length of minutes to be unwieldy for Council, staff, and public

### **Granicus (current vendor) captioning and transcription service for televised meetings**

- Live transcriber during the meeting provides real-time captioning for viewers of the live Granicus feed
- Captions are immediately available for all of the on demand archives as well
- Transcriptions are searchable
- Optional caption encoder for City Channel viewers can be purchased for about \$3,000
- City provides transcriber with list of proper names and locations unique to Cupertino (which helps with the accuracy of the transcription)
- Transcription document available within 48 hours after meeting
- Not intended as verbatim minutes (City’s responsibility to make any necessary corrections)
- After-the-fact captioning/transcription service also available at about \$200/hour
- 98% accuracy rate
- Dynamic Pricing (the more contact hours bought, the lower the rate)
- Average Price: \$140/Hour (i.e. for 50 hours/year contract)
- Cities of Sunnyvale and San Jose use Granicus captioning services for reference only and action minutes and video recording are considered the official record

### **3PlayMedia caption and transcription service (youtube live)**

- YouTube Live has auto-captioning feature for videos up to about four hours in duration
- Only about 88-90% accurate
- The auto-captioning (speech-to-text) has difficulty with proper names and syntax
- Auto-captioning does not work for videos with durations of 4 hours and greater
- Average Pricing: \$2.50/minute
- Translation Services (other languages): \$10-\$26/minute depending on the language

### **3PlayMedia Zoom Room conferencing captions and transcriptions for commission meetings**

- Transcriptions are available in the following formats...
  - \* Keyword Cloud
  - \* Word Doc
  - \* P3 Transcript
  - \* JS Transcript
  - \* PDF
  - \* Plain Text
  - \* Stamped Doc
  - \* HTML
  - \* JSON Transcript
- Digital transcripts are searchable
- Can also add subtitles to Zoom Room video recordings
- Standard Caption encoding and transcription rate: \$2.50/minute (\$150/hr.)
- Standard transcription turnaround is 4 business days
- Zoom Room Language translation services vary between \$9/minute and \$25/minute depending on the language

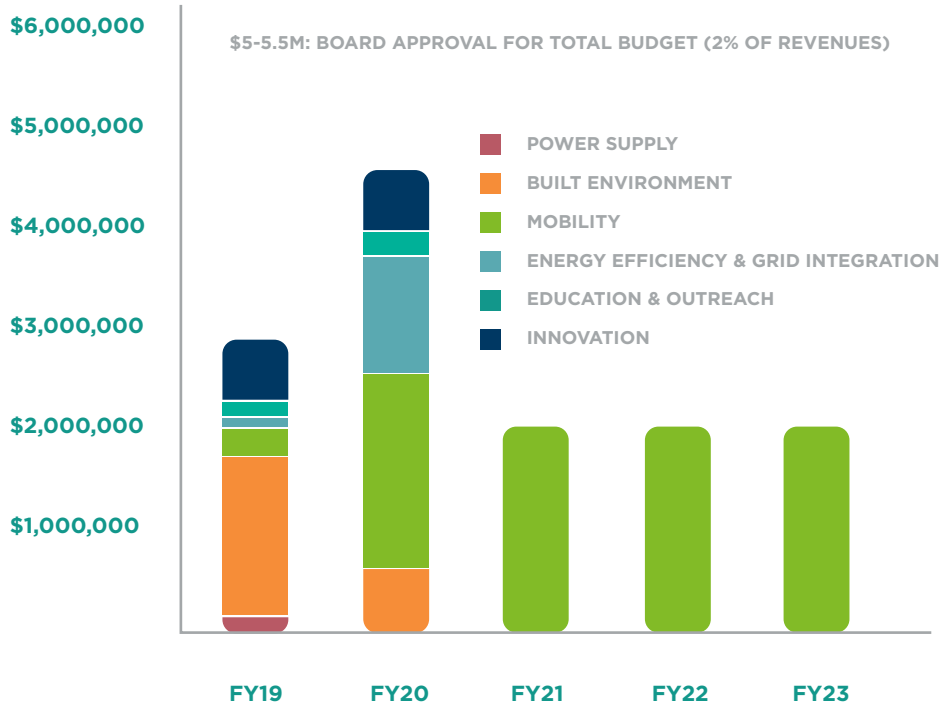

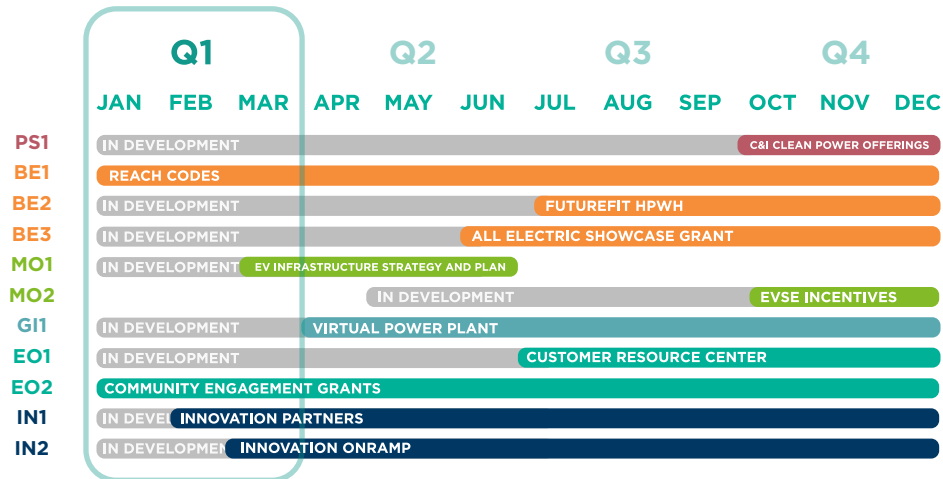

# TIMELINE

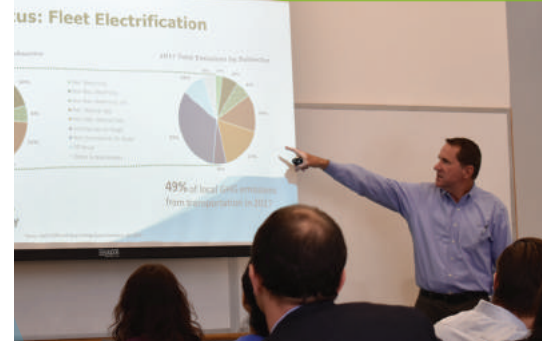

# DECARBONIZATION PROGRAMS QUARTERLY UPDATE

## JAN - MAR 2019



The Decarbonization Strategy and Programs Roadmap was adopted to cut emissions in half by 2030\*. The Roadmap features more than a dozen programs that will reduce energy-related emissions from natural gas usage in buildings, transportation and power supply, all while empowering customers, enhancing energy efficiency and increasing renewable energy on the grid.

This pamphlet is produced quarterly to provide updates on the development of these programs.

## Reach Codes

- Partnering with Peninsula Clean Energy (PCE) and San Mateo County to develop amendments to the state energy code for local governments
- The amendments, known as 'reach codes' encourage all-electric new construction - and lower-cost construction options for healthier, safer, emissions-free buildings
- SVCE and PCE are providing technical assistance and a \$10,000 incentive to member agencies that bring reach codes to their council
- Draft codes are now being developed for council review in late summer, coincident with adoption of the new 2019 building code taking effect Jan. 1, 2020



## Power Supply

Achieve a sustainable, affordable and carbon-free power supply, and encourage smart investments that support decarbonization



## Education & Outreach

Educate and engage customers about their energy use, and how to lower their carbon footprint



## Energy Efficiency & Grid Integration

- Engages Silicon Valley's 'innovation ecosystem' in addressing key technical, market and policy barriers to achieving deep decarbonization, locally and beyond
- Two stages of grant funding available: proof of concept (\$10,000 - \$75,000), and funding for demonstrations (\$50,000 - \$100,000)
- First quarterly application deadline April 30, 2019

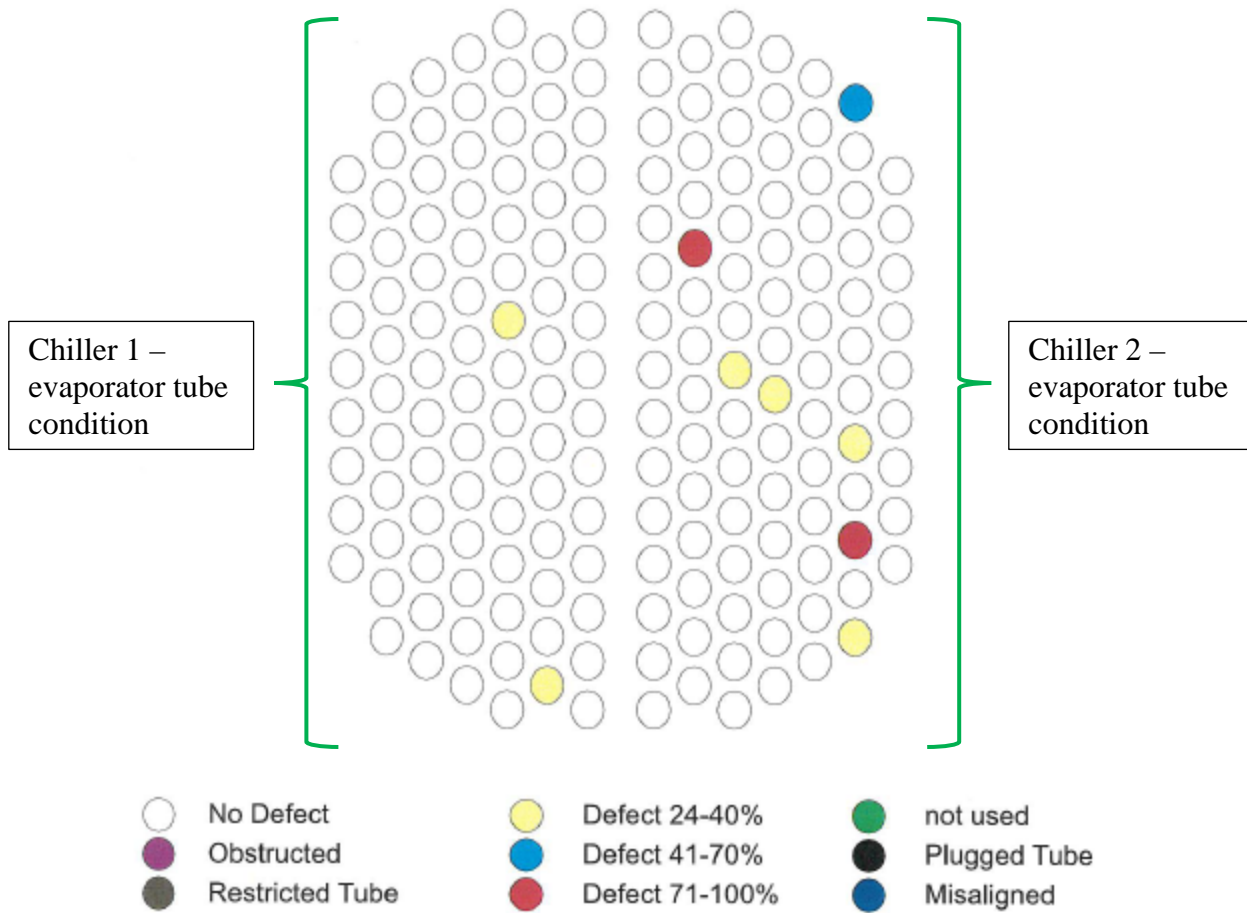


## EV Charging Infrastructure Strategy and Plan

- Board approved \$8M for investment in EV charging equipment over four years
- Launched an initiative with member cities and other stakeholders to develop strategy, organization and programs to guide regional EV infrastructure investment
- Led formation of a two-county coalition with Peninsula Clean Energy, San Jose, Santa Clara, and Palo Alto to apply for California Energy Commission block grant funding for additional EV charging infrastructure incentives

# City of Cupertino Sales Tax *Update*

First Quarter Receipts for Fourth Quarter Sales (October - December 2018)

## Cupertino In Brief

Cupertino's receipts from October through December were 14.0% below the fourth sales period in 2017. Excluding reporting aberrations, actual sales were down 15.2%.

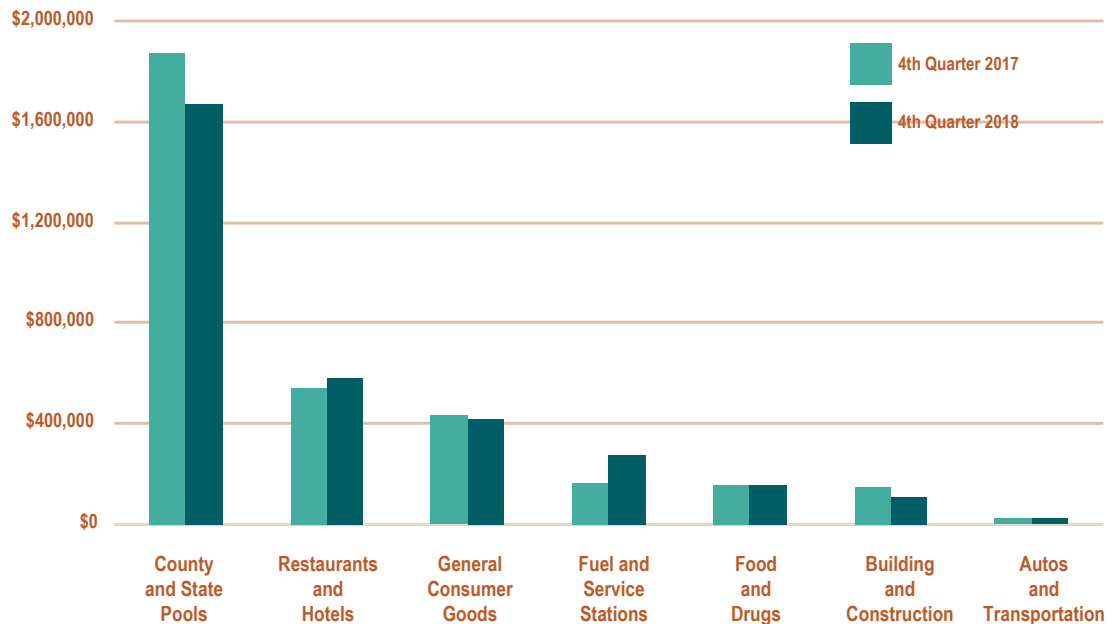
New restaurant openings since the year-ago comparison quarter were largely responsible for the gains in restaurants and hotels. A double payment in services stations inflated results which posted a 10% increase after accounting for anomalies.

The Apple Campus project completed most of its work since the comparison quarter causing returns related to the construction to decline as expected.

Due to the point of sale decrease, the City's allocation from the countywide use tax pool decreased by 14%.

Net of aberrations, taxable sales for all of Santa Clara County grew 2.5% over the comparable time period; the Bay Area was up 2.3%.

**Statewide Results**

The local one cent share of sales and use tax from October through December sales was 2.8% higher than 2017's holiday quarter after factoring for state reporting aberrations.

The overall increase came primarily from a solid quarter for contractor materials and equipment, expanded production by an auto manufacturer and rising fuel prices. Online fulfillment centers, new technology investment and cannabis start-ups also produced significant gains. Receipts in the six county Sacramento region grew 7.9% over last year while the remainder of the state was generally flat or exhibited only minor growth.

Notable was the 0.09% rise in tax receipts from brick and mortar retailers which is the lowest holiday gain for that sector since 2009. A 9.6% increase in receipts from online shopping which is allocated to central order desks or county pools was part of the reason. Other factors include lower prices, gift cards which move purchases to future quarters and greater gifting of non-taxable experiences and services.

**The Retail Evolution Continues**

A recent survey identified U.S. closures of 102 million sq. ft. of retail space in 2017 and an additional 155 million sq. ft. in 2018. Similar losses are expected in 2019 with 5,300 closures already announced. Payless Shoes, Gymboree, Performance Bicycle and Charlotte Russe are going out of business while chains including Sears, Kmart, Macy's, JCPenney, Kohl's, Nordstrom, Dollar Tree, Victoria's Secret, Chico's, Foot Locker and Lowe's have announced plans for further cuts in oversaturated markets and downsizing of stores.

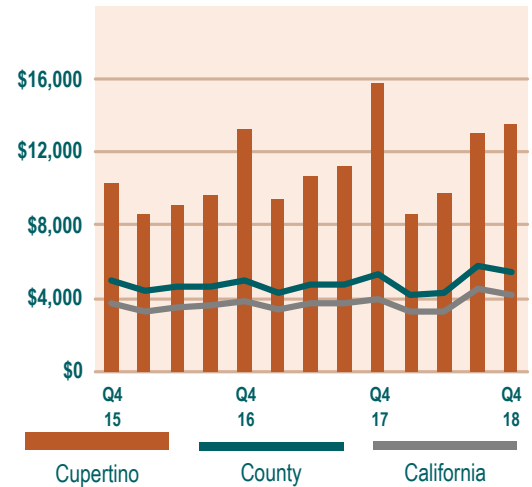
Retailers are not planning the end of physical stores which continue to be important for personalized experiences and shopping entertainment. However, the shifting trends encourage reduced square footage with less overhead to better compete on prices and provide more intimate shopping encounters.

With smartphones allowing purchase and delivery of almost anything at any time of the day without leaving home, big box retailers are responding by downsizing stores and subleasing excess space to compatible businesses to help draw traffic. Locations where people congregate for entertainment, food and services have become part of the evolving strategy as has integrating retail with more convenient spots for pick-up and delivery of online orders.

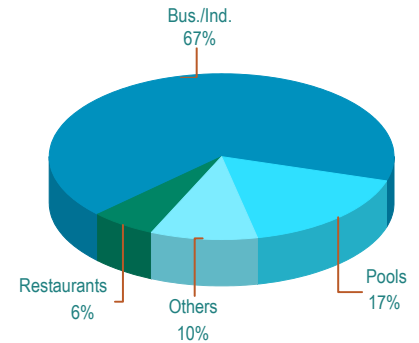
Barry Foster of HdL's EconSolutions, notes that "shifting shopping habits present challenges but also opportunities." "Smaller footprints enable expanding into smaller niche markets while mixed use projects and 18-hour environments are chances to rebuild downtowns and reinvigorate shopping centers."

With more companies using the internet to sell directly to customers from their warehouses, the trend also provides jurisdictions whose populations aren't adequate in size to support large scale retail to focus on industrial development for sales tax as well as jobs.

**Date: May 6, 2019**

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Innovation Technology (IT) have reviewed the issues that caused two different versions of the Vallco general plan amendment resolution showing up in the City's record retention system, Laserfiche. In truth, only one version existed, but different data was produced depending on settings.

The issues involved general settings in both Adobe and Laserfiche. To date, IT staff have changed default Laserfiche settings to ensure PDF annotations are preserved and that images are combined into a single document. Additionally, spot training with staff responsible for Laserfiche entries has occurred to ensure default settings are not changed.

The City is moving towards saving all Laserfiche records as TIFF images and is developing a timeline to convert all existing PDF files to TIFF. IT will ensure that the proper settings are in place to preserve annotations prior to converting PDF to TIFF.

Finally, the City is developing a versioning plan for all documents. Versioning provides an easy path to determine what was changed, by whom and when.

I would be glad to meet with you and/or your staff to provide clarification or additional information.
