COVID-19 News and Updates

New Requirements for Santa Clara County Public Health Order

Due to the recent surge in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations, the Health Officer is implementing new requirements for Santa Clara County. These changes went into effect Monday, November 30 and will remain in effect until at least 5 a.m. on December 21, unless they are extended.

Quarantine after travel

- Leisure and non-essential travel are discouraged.
- If you travel more than 150 miles outside the County's borders, you are required to quarantine for 14 days upon your return.
- Exceptions are for healthcare workers providing care or patients obtaining treatment.

Outdoor Gatherings

- Gatherings continue to be allowed only outdoors, with a maximum of 100 people.
- The State limits such gatherings to First Amendment protected activities, such as religious services or protests.

Hotels and Lodging

- Hotels and other lodging facilities are open only for essential travel and for use to facilitate isolation or quarantine.

Indoor facilities

- Stores and other facilities open to the public are limited to 10% capacity indoors.
- Grocery stores, drug stores, and pharmacies are limited to 25% max capacity.

Professional Collegiate and Youth Sports

- Recreational activities that involve physical contact or close proximity to those outside one's household are temporarily prohibited.
- People can continue to engage in outdoor athletics and recreation where social distancing can be maintained at all times.

New Requirements for Businesses

With Santa Clara County's most recent Public Health Order, as explained above, here are a few key changes specifically for businesses:

Capacity Limits for Indoor Facilities Open to the Public

- Stores and other facilities open to the public will be limited to 10% capacity indoors.
- Grocery stores, drug stores, and pharmacies, however, will be allowed to operate at 25% capacity indoors to ensure adequate access to food and medicine.
- All facilities open to the public must establish a "metering system" to ensure that the applicable capacity limits are not exceeded by, for example, posting an employee at the facility entrance to track the number of people entering and exiting.

The County has also enacted new [Mandatory Directive on Capacity Limitations](#) with some additional capacity limitations for businesses and activities – updated Maximum Capacity signage must be posted at the business. County's Mandatory Directive and Tips for Safer Holidays

The County of Santa Clara is strongly discouraging nonessential travel, including holiday travel. Travel outside the Bay Area will increase your chance of getting infected and spreading the virus to others after your return. For those who are traveling, there are tips to help avoid catching COVID-19 or spreading it to fellow travelers. If you travel more than 150 miles from the County's borders, you are required to self-quarantine for 14 days upon your return.

The joint recommendations from Health Officials in Santa Clara County advise the public that if you gather in person, keep it small, short, stable, and outdoors.

Celebrate Without Gathering:

The safest way to celebrate this holiday season is virtually or with members of your household. Gathering with people outside your household – even extended family – increases the risk of getting and spreading COVID-19. There are many ways to enjoy the holidays with loved ones without gathering:

- Enjoy holiday traditions at home with your household
- Decorate your home and/or yard
- Share a virtual meal with family and friends
- Host online parties and/or contests
- Prepare meals using traditional recipes and deliver to family and neighbors
- Attend holiday movie nights at drive-in venues
- Visit holiday-themed outdoor art installations
- Participate in drive-by events where everyone stays in their vehicles

State Relief for Small Businesses

The swift reaction by consumers and businesses to the outbreak of COVID-19 in the U.S. has caused a huge decrease in spending on certain goods and services. The national and state response, combined with the uncertainty of how long the presence of the virus will disrupt the U.S. economy, has made revenue forecasting particularly challenging.

On December 1, the California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (CDTFA) began accepting applications for tentative small business hiring credit reservation amounts through an online reservation system. Qualified small business employers must apply with the CDTFA for a credit reservation. The credit reservations will be allocated to qualified small business employers on a first-come, first-served basis. The reservation system will be available from December 1, 2020 at 8 a.m. through January 15, 2021. Within 30 days of receiving an application, CDTFA will notify each applicant via email whether a tentative credit reservation has been allocated to them and the amount of the tentative credit reservation. The credit is equal to \$1,000 per qualified employee and up to \$100,000 for each small business employer. Click [here](#) for more information and to apply through the CDTFA. 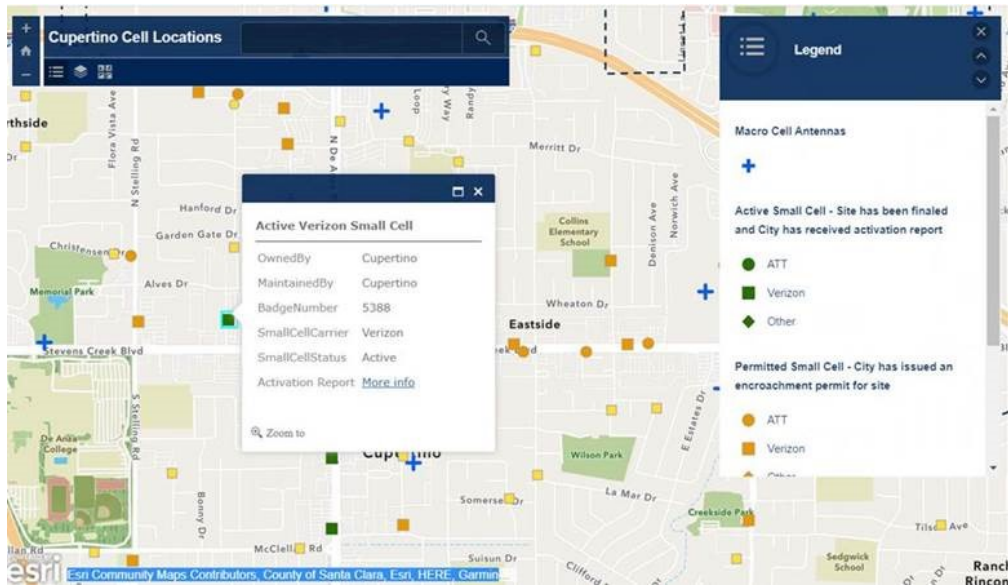
Study Sessions on Small and Macro Cell Facilities

On September 15, the Cupertino City Council held their last study session on small cell facilities. The City has compiled and posted videos of the study session, along with three previous sessions on small cells, on its [Small Cell Information webpage](#). As a result of the session, [small cell permitting guidelines](#) were established. These guidelines provide carriers with guidance to help site small cell in less intrusive areas, while still ensuring state and Federal Communications Commission (FCC) laws and regulations are followed. The agenda and staff report on this matter can be found in the City's [Public Meetings Portal](#). Also on the Small Cell Information webpage are links to the Telecommunications Act of 1996 and FCC's September 26, 2018 Order, which both provide relevant information on federal regulations for wireless facilities.

A small cell is a small antenna placed on a utility pole or streetlight, typically in the public right-of-way. Small cell facilities include associated cellular facilities that are used to enhance coverage and capacity of wireless communications networks, including 4G and 5G signals. Cellular usage by the public has increased exponentially in the last 20 years. Small cell facilities are the wireless industries' solution to address the growing demands for wireless services and the need to overcome the limitation in available frequency spectrum. Small cell facilities achieve this by repeating and reusing the same frequencies at different locations in a geographic area, resulting in multiple nodes for their licensed spectrum.



The City's Geographic Information System (GIS) Division, in collaboration with the Development Services Division of the Public Works Department, published a new Small Cell and Macro Cell Tower Interactive Map. The mobile-friendly map displays the macro cell tower and small cell locations throughout Cupertino.



Small cell sites are added at the proposed permit stage and denoted by yellow shapes across the map. As the small cell applications are issued permits for construction, the shape color changes to orange. Finally, as the facilities are completed and activated, the active small cells are denoted as green shapes.

Users can access the map and view which carrier that small cell facility serves, identify permit numbers, permit status, and view the activation report if the site is active.

In comparison, a macro facility typically consists of three to 16 panel antennas mounted on the roof of a building or on a cell tower, along with multiple equipment cabinets. The macro cells are added to the map when a permit is finalized, noted as blue plus signs.

Extra Sweeping in Heavy Leaf Fall Areas

The City has launched extra street sweeping service in designated “heavy leaf fall” areas in Cupertino during November and December. This service supplements regularly scheduled sweeping on City streets. The extra sweeping occurs on the same day of the week as the normally scheduled sweeping, providing two extra sweeps per month in these areas to remove the accumulated leaves. The City has proactively communicated with residents in flood protection areas to place leaves in their yard trimmings carts and not to blow leaves into the street or create piles at the curb. See the attached list of streets below.

Emergency Assistance for Unhoused Members of Encampments

On November 19, the Cupertino City Council approved the allocation of \$200,000 for emergency assistance to help unhoused members of the Wolfe Road and Interstate 280 encampments.

The City Manager is also authorized to negotiate and execute any contracts necessary to facilitate the emergency assistance.

The City of Cupertino, in partnership with the nonprofit agency Abode Services and the County of Santa Clara, has coordinated a pathway to housing for those living at encampments at Wolfe Road and Interstate 280. A resolution was scheduled for December 2 and the relocation process has begun.

A series of events led to the determination that a pathway to housing is a necessary step for the health and safety of the participants. These events include:

- Inadequate spacing at the encampment which is against Santa Clara County Public Health Guidance for COVID-19
- An August 2020 hit-and-run collision resulting in the death of an encampments visitor
- Proximity to a high-vehicular traffic roadway and freeway onramp
- Upcoming extreme cold and wet weather

Those at the encampment will be offered temporary housing for six months or relocated to a safer outdoor area with services coming to them during that period. This unique solution came out of months of discussion and deliberation to ensure the care of these encampment members during this unusual time in our history as we face a deadly pandemic.

Notable City Events

Torrey Pine Tree Donation and Planting

Cupertino residents Dennis and Barbara West generously donated a rare Torrey Pine tree to the City. Staff from the City's Grounds Division prepared the area and installed drip irrigation to the new tree before a tree planting event was held at Varian Park on November 12.



The City is appreciative of this addition to our tree canopy and thank the West family for the donation. Barbara West wrote a letter detailing the time, care, and effort taken to bring this tree to life. The following is part of the letter:

“With so many challenges in 2020, I think we are all thirsty for positive news, and what could be more positive than planting a very rare tree in a City park.

Torrey Pine trees hold the title of the rarest pine in the United States with an estimated number of 4,500 to 9,000 trees. Since the Torrey Pine is so rare, I thought it would be important to help save this species, so I gathered the pine cones...I warmed the pine cones in my oven, then gently cracked open the seeds inside, and then placed the seeds in a special sterilized soil preparation. I placed the seed and soil in a plastic bag and stored it in the refrigerator crisper for 30 days. After 30 days, each seed was planted in a special little pot...for two years, I brought the pots inside every night and outside every day.

I am delighted that the City has found a wonderful location at Varian Park.”

The City of Cupertino's Economic Development Division hosted Drop-by Coffee Connect for the Cupertino Business & Professional Women's Group in an effort to stay engaged and support local women business owners and professionals. The event was held on November 19 from 10 a.m. to 11 a.m. in front of Cupertino City Hall. To-go coffee, tea, and care packages were provided to the 20+ participants who stopped by during the hour. City Manager Deb Feng and Councilmember-Elect Hung Wei were in attendance to talk with visitors.

Fall Care Cards Connect Generations and Cupertino Community

The Cupertino Senior Center partnered with local youth to write themed letters to senior residents, Block Leaders, and Senior Center volunteers. To date, this partnership has mailed over 750 letters with uplifting messages and short stories. The intent of this program is to bring generations together and create a positive, connected community.

Students Participate in Innovative Entrepreneurs Program

The City’s Parks and Recreation Department collaborated with students from the Cupertino High School’s Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) organization for the first time to host the free Innovative Entrepreneurs program. Throughout two weekends, 28 seventh and eighth graders were introduced to the basics of entrepreneurship by FBLA students.

The program included the process behind starting a business, market research, constructing a business plan, writing executive summaries, and much more. Students were split up into seven teams and used these concepts to create a product or service and create a formal business plan. The faux companies included a drone delivery system, youth temperature sensor, meeting reminder application, and many more innovative ideas.



At the end of the program, the seven teams presented to a group of judges that consisted of Silicon Valley entrepreneurs and CEOs. The course was sold out with a waitlist, and survey respondents gave the program a four-point-three out of five stars.

Cupertino's Teen Leaders Attend Bay Area Networking Conference

On November 20, Cupertino's Youth Activity Board and the Teen Commission participated in the first virtual Youth Activity Council (YAC) Social. Annually, the YAC Social brings youth and teen commissioners together from across the Bay Area to socialize, network, and inspire one another. With youth and teens experiencing an especially challenging time during the COVID-19 pandemic, recreation coordinators from around the Bay Area felt it was critical to offer youth a respite from their daily stressors. Advisors, including staff from the City of Cupertino, diligently transformed the YAC Social to a virtual platform, allowing them to continue providing teens with this unique chance to connect with peers across different cities. We are ecstatic to report that over 140 teens across 17 Bay Area cities connected through Zoom to exchange ideas and discuss mental health and social justice issues. Based on the YAC Social's success, the California Parks and Recreation Society (CPRS) awarded the event their "Five Snaps" award.

Hello City Manager, Deborah Feng,

I hope this email finds you well and happy.

As you will recall, I am the long time Cupertino City resident who is totally delighted with the wonderful road improvements the City has made to Cordova Road.

I have been working with Chad Mosley and Brian Gathers on finding the correct City Park location to plant a very rare young Torrey Pine Tree. Brian has located a wonderful location in Varian Park and his staff is currently preparing the site.

Since Cupertino is a "Tree City," I thought you might like to have a small informal tree dedication ceremony when the site is ready to plant the tree, possibly with coverage in the Cupertino Courier. With so many challenges in 2020, I think we are all thirsty for positive news, and what could be more positive than planting a very rare tree in a City Park.

The background on the Torrey Pine is that for safety reasons the Developer of a three-parcel site on Cordova Road had to remove the large parent Torrey Pine. Torrey pine trees hold the title of the rarest pine in the United States with an estimated number of 4,500 to 9,000 trees. Most Torrey Pines are located near San Diego, but a few are scattered as far North as the Bay Area. The Torrey Pine is hardy and can handle drought, wind and poor soil. It is an iconic and proud tree with a beautiful profile. The Torrey Pine nuts were once eaten by the Native American people.

Since the Torrey pine is so rare, I thought it would be important to help save this species, so I gathered the pine cones as the parent tree was being removed. With the advice of the Apple Arborist, Dave Muffly, I went through an elaborate process that seemed a little like cooking. I warmed the pine cones in my oven, then gently cracked open the seeds inside, and then placed the seeds in a special sterilized soil preparation. I placed the seed and soil in a plastic bag and stored it in the refrigerator crisper for 30 days.

After 30 days, each seed was planted in a special little pot and the pots were placed on top of a heating pad and under a grow light. It was fun to watch little green stems protrude from the soil and start to grow.

For two years, I brought the pots inside every night and outside every day. Now, we have the start of 4 beautiful young Torrey Pine trees in 15-gallon containers (just right sized to plant in the ground), and the City has agreed to take at least one.

I am delighted that the City has found a wonderful location at Varian Park and will be ready to plant a tree soon.

As the City Manager, I thought you might want to be part of this very positive event (with proper social distancing and face coverings) that reinforces Cupertino's dedication to be a "Tree City".
