Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance Meetings

The Department of Water Resources (DWR) has prepared a Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance, pursuant to the requirements of the Water Conservation in Landscaping Act of 2006 (AB 1881, Laird). This Ordinance has been in effect since January 1, 2010. A local jurisdiction may adopt its own ordinance as long as it complies with, or is more stringent than, the State ordinance.

The City is working to draft an ordinance that will focus on: (1) conformance with State requirements, (2) streamlining the approval process, and (3) minimizing costs for applicants and homeowners. The new Water Efficient Landscape ordinance will replace the City's existing Xeriscape Landscaping Ordinance (Chapter 14.15 of the Cupertino Municipal Code).

Homeowners, residents, property owners and interested parties are invited to a Community Meeting on Wednesday, March 10, 2010 at 6:30 pm.

A Planning Commission Hearing will be held on Tuesday, March 23, 2010 at 6:45 pm.

Wound Treatment: When seconds count, stop the bleeding!

Hopefully you will never find yourself in a situation where you will be responsible for tending to someone's or your own wounds, but just in case, here are some basic tips to stop bleeding.

The human circulatory system is essentially a series of pipes, which bleed at various rates depending on the type of pipe it is or the size of the pipe.

Capillary Bleeding

This type of bleeding is rarely a problem unless it is on the face or scalp. Apply direct pressure to the wound.

Venous Bleeding

In this type of wound, bleeding can usually be stopped using just the pressure from your finger and the weight of your hand. Be sure to have a gauze pad or a sterile dressing ready to cover/suppress the bleeding.

Arterial Bleeding

Arterial bleeding is the most dangerous of all, because it can generate rapid and large volumes of blood. To treat, locate the exact site of the bleed, apply direct pressure with your finger. Then apply pressure followed by applying a bandage. Tourniquets to stop bleeding are a last resort. Restricting blood flow with a tourniquet can cause the body part below the pressure site to die.

Water is always listed as an essential emergency supply. Imagine that a major earthquake has caused broken water lines. Your local news station instructs you not to drink water out of the faucet. How much do you know about water in emergency situations?

Sources of water

Hot water heater, ice cubes, rear toilet tank.

Storing water

There are a variety of methods, depending on your needs.

55 gallon drums – Water is treated with chemicals and is replaced once a year. Individual gallons – Store in a dark place and replace every six months to 1 year. Do not store with other emergency supplies in

Single serving bottled water – Most convenient because you can use the water for day to day activities and replace as needed. Replace every 6 months.

Water stored in clear plastic containers, or exposed to sunlight, must be replaced every six months.

Purifying water

case a container leaks.

These two methods will kill most contaminants in water.

Boiling

Boiling is the safest method of treating water. Bring water to a rolling boil for 3-5 minutes, keeping in mind that some water will evaporate. Let the water cool before drinking.

Bleach

You can use household liquid bleach to kill microorganisms. Use only regular household liquid bleach that contains 5.25 percent sodium hypochlorite. Do not use scented bleaches, colorsafe bleaches or bleaches with added cleaners. Add 16 drops of bleach per gallon of water, stir and let stand for 30 minutes. If the water does not have a slight bleach odor, repeat the dosage and let stand another 15 minutes.

The only agent used to treat water should be household liquid bleach. Other chemicals, such as iodine or water treatment products sold in camping or surplus stores, that do not contain 5.25 percent sodium hypochlorite as the only active ingredient, are not recommended and should not be used.

roots | What's That Noise?

Picture a peaceful day in the Santa Clara Valley about 75 some odd years ago. The fruit tree blossoms perfume the air and fall like a snowy carpet on the fertile ground for miles around. The sun is warm, the sky is blue and life in the valley moves to nature's rhythms. And then...

It starts in the distance... a low roaring

sound... and builds... until it sounds like an oncoming tornado. The first time I remember hearing the sound as a child, it was a little scary. After the first few times, we all would just say "there goes the wind tunnel" and keep on doing whatever task was at hand. In the 1930's people would sometimes look up in the sky and see a huge oblong shape floating in the air... a magnificent sight to behold... no screaming jet engines... just silently gliding over the valley, towards Mt. View and the Moffet Field Naval Air Station... the huge airship, the U.S.S. Macon was coming home.

The enormous hangars and wind tunnels and assorted other facilities at Moffet Field were

begun with actual construction on October 5, 1931. The new west coast lighter-thanair facility was commissioned in April 1933. Hangar One is visible for miles from vantage points around the valley. It covers 8 acres and can accommodate seven football fields. Its dimensions are 1,133 feet long, 308 feet wide and the elongated dome is 198 feet high. Its unique and spectacular "orange peel" doors are 500 tons apiece and each door is operated by a 150 horse-power motor. There is one elevator for maintenance workers to access its lofty heights. Standard gauge rails ran through the length of the hangar and into the

adjacent fields at each end to position the airship on the mooring mast for the interior of the hangar or in flight position.

Hangar One was home for a time to the huge dirigible, the U.S.S. Macon. The Macon cleared the sides of the hangar by 6 to 12 feet. Hangar One not only accommodated this giant airship but

several smaller non-rigid LTA craft simultaneously. Hangar One is closed for last five year because of contamination. For more info visit www. moffettfieldmuseum. org. Sadly, the U.S.S. Macon was lost at sea in 1935. She went down, tail first, off Point Sur, near the California coast on a foggy day. Years later, a fisherman snagged a girder from the airship in some of his nets - and it was displayed for a time on the wall of a restaurant in Moss Landing, near Monterey. Several expeditions were launched and the remains of the U.S.S. Macon were finally pinpointed by research vessels and diving teams.

STAR label use 1/3 the energy of a traditional bulb, can last up to 10 times longer, and save \$30 or more in energy costs over their lifetime. The ENERGY STAR CFLs can be found anywhere you cur-



rently shop for light bulbs. If every American swapped just one bulb for an ENERGY STAR labeled CFL, it would collectively save more than \$8 billion in energy costs, prevent burning 30 billion pounds of coal, and remove 2 million cars worth of green-

house gas emissions from our atmosphere. Another bonus is that, the less energy it takes to light your house, the lower your electricity bills.

When it rains, pesticides that are used in landscapes, gardens, and around your home, are washed off plants, soils, and grass. This stormwater runs off the landscape and flows to the nearest storm drain, which ultimately carries the water to a local creek or the Bay, without treatment. Minimizing our use of pesticides in landscape maintenance is important to help protect water quality, aquatic life, and our own health. Pest control fact sheets include information on less-toxic products and techniques are available at two local nurseries in Cupertino: Yamagami's and Summer winds. Nursery staff has received special training on pest control and can guide customers in using an "Integrated Pest Management" approach to resolve their bug problems. Fact sheets are also available at www.mywatershedwatch.org.

Car Wash Fundraising Event

Water from washing cars not only contains dirt and soap, but also oil, grease, and metals such as copper, nickel, and zinc. These materials can be toxic to fish, birds, and other wildlife living in our local creeks and in the San Francisco Bay. Traditional car wash fundraisers can cause water pollution, if wash water flows to the storm drain. Here are a few alternatives: Contact local commercial car washes for discounted passes you can sell at a higher price to raise funds. Hold the event at a commercial car wash and ask them to donate part of the profits if you help to advertise. Partner with a self-serve car wash to host the event at their facility and wash cars for tips. Wash cars on a field instead of a parking lot, so soapy water will not run into storm drains, streets or gutters. If you still want to hold a traditional car wash fundraiser, you can borrow the City of Cupertino's Free Car Wash Kit. The Car Wash Kit drains runoff into the Sanitary Sewer lines, rather than into the storm drains, which flow untreated into our creeks and into the bay. Compost Available Again for Cupertino Residents

The city's compost site reopens on March 26 – in time for spring planting (as long as it doesn't rain). The Stevens Creek Quarry site on Stevens Canyon Road (across



from the dam) will be open for bulk compost pickup on Friday and Saturday mornings, from 8:30 - 11 am, at no charge. No appointments are necessary. The site is closed during rainy weather or if the site remains muddy and on holiday weekends (Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day).

- Only city residents can use this program. Please bring proof of residency.
- There will not be any staff at the site to assist residents in shoveling compost or moving bags.
- Please bring adequate shovels and people to help.
- Residents are limited to 15 minutes of shoveling if other cars are waiting.
- Bring containers, an old trashcan, a tarp or bags to hold your compost.
- For your convenience, two bags per car will be available for use.
