

Text-to-911 is an option to help those who are:

- Hearing or speech impaired...
 Evolution of TTY
- In a situation where it's not safe to call 9-1-1
- Having a medical emergency and cannot speak on the phone



Text-to-911

DOES NOT replace calling 9-1-1 under most circumstances.


- Dispatchers handle texting emergencies slightly different then calling 911
- Communication between dispatcher and texter will be slower
- May be more difficult to determine location of texter

County Communications Text-to-9-1-1



- Live for 3 years
- Processed 25 Text-to-911 emergencies in August 2023
- Launched an updated CAD system and received additional training in September 2023

All Dispatch Centers within Santa Clara County have Text to 9-1-1 capabilities










Residential Burglaries Jan-Sep 2023



Majority of break-ins occurred via a glass door break, typically a rear slider



42% of reported cases, the time frame of occurrence is unknown and happened over the course of multiple days/weeks (unoccupied residence, homeowners out-of-town, etc.


21% of reported cases, the crime occurred at an apartment or condominium complex - communal mailboxes, detached garage, bike storage area

Prevention Tips

Activate home alarm or surveillance systems


- In an overwhelming majority of cases reported, burglars made entry by breaking a rear glass door, often one leading directly to the master bedroom of the home
- A live monitored system, sensitive to doors/windows and reporting directly to Sheriff's emergency dispatch line, is a preferred method of alarm security
- o Remember to activate system every time you leave your home
- Know how to use and keep alarm system in good working order
- Alarm systems are a deterrent and reduce likelihood of burglary or limit losses
- Lock your doors and windows, even when you are home
- If you're leaving town:
 - Do not broadcast this information on social media
 - o Place a temporary stop on newspaper and mail, or have trusted person collect daily
 - Lock all windows and doors
 - Activate alarm and surveillance systems
 - Make it appear like someone is home put lights on timer, have bins put out/picked up on trash day, place a hold on mail and newspapers
 - Keep travel plans offline, do not post on social media
 - Ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your house and to immediately report any suspicious activity by calling 9-1-1
 - Submit a patrol check request to our office at https://www.sccgov.org/sites/sheriff
 - Consider where you store your valuables -master bedrooms and closets are the main target, as these areas of the home are where criminals expect to find handbags, jewelry, and safes
- Don't leave valuables in plain sight
- Do not leave spare keys hidden near your front door consider leaving a spare with your neighbor instead
- Be neighborly, and report suspicious activity in an effort to reduce crime where you live
 - Some activities that may be considered suspicious include:
 - Unusual noises such as screaming, alarm activations, glass breaking, or dogs barking
 - Slow moving vehicles, vehicles driving with lights off at night, vehicles left unattended while running, and unknown vehicles parked at a neighbor's house
 - People behaving strangely, going door to door, entering side yards, parked inside a vehicle for an extended period or wearing clothing inconsistent with the weather
 - If unsure, do not be reluctant to call 9-1-1
 - If it's suspicious to you, it's worth reporting
 - Timely reporting greatly assists with the prevention or interruption of crime, and the apprehension of criminals


Commercial Burglaries




Commercial Burglaries Jan-Sep 2023 = 79 total

51 = merchandise valued at \$950+ stolen from retailer during business hours, some "shopliftings" codified as felony commercial burglary 28 = cash, electronics, food, merchandise, and tools stolen from various types of businesses, e.g., restaurant, professional practice, etc.

UNMANNED AERIAL SYSTEMS (UAS) PROGRAM



Senate Bill 230

- > Senate Bill 230 emphasized the continued need for law enforcement to leverage de-escalation tools and tactics.
- De-escalation should be used whenever possible to minimize, divert, or eliminate conflict or potential for use of force (UOF).
- ➤ UAS will decrease our UOF and provide increased officer safety.
- The information provided by the UAS would improve oversight of critical incidents and allows for better tactical decision making.
- > A reduction in injuries to staff by smarter operations.

Benefits of a UAS Program for Law Enforcement




- Overhead observations providing critical updates to first responders on crucial public safety missions
- > Intel on an incident leading to better decision making
- Provides another avenue to facilitate announcements and opportunities to resolve incidents before UOF required
- > Both indoor / outdoor applications
- Cost efficiency: minimal purchase / repair costs
- Evidence gathering / scene documentation
- Public transparency



Elements of the Sheriff's Office UAS Program



- General Order for authorized UAS use and oversight
 - o Draft policy available on Sheriff's Office website
- Addressed privacy considerations through the Surveillance Use Policy pursuant to County Surveillance Technology and Community Safety Ordinance
 - o Reviewed by Privacy Office, CCO & OCLEM
- > Public information & transparency will be posted on website
- Operator training and certification through FAA
- > Flight and maintenance logs
- Vast complaint process:
 - Incident supervisor, IA, written complaint, phone complaint, in-person complaint or email to Military Equipment Coordinator

Authorized Uses

- Public safety and life preservation missions
- Locate missing/lost persons
- Search and Rescue missions
- Crime scene/traffic collision documentation
- Explosive device or hazardous materials mitigation
- Citizen or law enforcement rescue operations
- Terrorism response operations
- Warnings to drone operators impeding emergency personnel
- Pursuant to a search warrant

- > Perimeter security at the jails
- High-risk security and dignitary protection details
- Brief monitoring of protests and demonstrations based on reported complaints
- Recon for tactical operations
- Mapping of critical infrastructure and large-scale events
- > Training missions
- Evidence collections when traditional methods unavailable
- Dept photos and video for recruitment
- Mutual aid support

Prohibited Uses



- Random surveillance activities with no legitimate public safety purpose.
- To target a person based solely on individual characteristics such as but not limited to race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, disability, gender or sexual orientation.
- To harass, intimidate or discriminate against any individual or group.
- To conduct personal business of any type.
- Shall not be weaponized.
- Shall not be integrated with facial recognition or biometric technology.
- > Shall not be used in violation of any Sheriff's Office policy or FAA regulation.





- ➤ UAS are defined as military equipment under AB 481 (Category 1) and fall under our General Order for Military Equipment Funding, Acquisition, and Use.
- The Board of Supervisors will have to approve the funding, acquisition and use before procurement.
- As part of the requirement for law enforcement agencies utilizing "military equipment", the Sheriff's Office created a policy that ensures compliance with statutory requirements and other established Sheriff's Office policies and procedures.
 - Draft policy is available for review on the department website
