2014 Drought Facts: The state of our State & City

In 2013, California experienced the driest year on record and current conditions suggest we may experience the same in 2014. As of April 2nd, Cupertino received 5.68" of rain this season, just 40% of normal levels. This rain is typically captured in our local reservoirs, serving as a primary source of fresh drinking water. However, due to our limited rainfall, the Santa Clara Valley Water District (the District) Water Tracker monthly assessment indicates that some local reservoirs are at 7—33% of capacity (www.valleywater.org/watertracker.aspx).

In January, Governor Brown declared a statewide drought emergency and asked all Californians to reduce their water use by 20%. The District responded by adopting a 20% water use reduction target, as only 80% of treated drinking water will be available to utilities and cities in its service territory this year. San Jose Water Company has implemented a set of conservation rules to reach the 20% target. Water conservation is always important in California, but this year we all need to do our part not to waste this precious resource.
